4-H, FFA & Grange Agreement

It is agreed that when an individual belongs to more than one organization, or exhibits as an independent, he/she must carry a different ownership/entrepreneurial project in each organization/independent. To further clarify this policy, when a member maintains projects in 4-H, FFA, Grange, or independently, the projects may not be in the same kind of livestock or crop production classification. For example, a beef project in FFA and a sheep project in 4-H would be acceptable since these two projects are both different species and produce a different commodity, but a beef breeding project in FFA and a beef market project in 4-H would not be acceptable as they are of the same species and produce the same commodity beef; even if the animals are of different breeds. A member of an FFA chapter, Grange or 4-H Club or independent exhibitor may transfer projects from one organization/independent to another only once during a calendar year. (continued on page 6)

Did You Know?

Program fees for the 2017-2018 4-H Club year will be increasing. Currently, Kings County 4-H members have been paying \$30/member and \$14/adult volunteer. The Kings County Sponsoring Committee has subsidized each member's program fees by \$8/member and \$4/adult volunteer.

The Annual Program fees paid by members and volunteers help support fundamental services, including insurance, program development, resources, events, required online systems, and staff to sustain and enhance exceptional programming for nearly 92,400 members and 13,500 adult volunteers.

Program fees for the 2017-2018 will be \$46/member and \$16/adult volunteer. The Sponsoring Committee will meet soon to determine how they can best support 4-H members and adult volunteer in covering this increase.

New for 2017:

Animal Release: Dog, Poultry and Rabbits are released after their shows. All other species will be released after the Awards Presentation on Saturday afternoon. Any animal exiting the fairgrounds before the release time will be charged a \$25.00 fee per animal.

Pen Cleanout: All animal pens must be cleaned out before leaving the fairgrounds, at the conclusion of the fair. Soiled bedding is to be disposed of in the designated area. There will be a \$10.00 fee per animal for any pens not cleaned out.

Livestock Pens: Pens will be assigned to the exhibitors. Exhibitors are not to move their animals to another pen.

All transfers must include official notification by the member to the organizations involved of their desire to drop/and or add a project and take place at a time that would allow for the supervision of the project by the respective organization/independent. Transfers must take place not less than 60 days (or the number of days required for the ownership and supervision of the respective species whichever is greater.) Once a project transfer is made, youth may not transfer their project to another organization for 12 months. 

- A high school senior, graduate, or equivalent who is already enrolled in or accepted to an institution of higher education. Institutions of higher education include accredited vocational schools, colleges or universities.
- Enrolled in the California 4-H Youth Development Program at the time of high school graduation or equivalent, such as receiving a General Education Diploma (GED)
- Enrolled or planning to enroll in at least half of the full-time course load as defined by the applicant's institution.

It's Spring – Jump Into It! What To Do When You Don't Feel Like Working Out

Whether you're a gym master or a fitness beginner, we all have days when we don't feel like working out. Maybe it's been a stressful week, and you just want to get home. Perhaps you've been working out for weeks and are feeling frustrated that you aren't seeing any results. Maybe you used to go to the gym regularly but fell off, and you're now having a hard time returning. Or maybe you just have no idea where to start and are feeling overwhelmed at the prospect. Whatever the reason, sometimes we just don't feel like working out. Here are some tactics to get you through.

Make a Plan

The first step to reach any goal is setting the goal in the first place. Try to make your goals S.M.A.R.T.

- Specific
- Measurable
- Attainable
- Relevant
- Time Bound

This is usually the part that trips people up. Many people know they want to feel better, but they don't know what will get them there because they haven't given it much thought. Losing weight is a measurable goal, but it isn't terribly specific. How much weight do you want to lose? Maybe you want to lose 10 pounds, which is specific and measurable. It's also more realistic and attainable than say you want to lose 50 pounds (which is still attainable, but much more difficult). Ask yourself whether the goal is relevant. If there's no real reason you want to lose weight, you likely won't stick to the goal. Finally, make it time bound by putting some constraints on the goal. How quickly do you want to lose 10 pounds? Two weeks may not be attainable, but two months might be. By making your goal time bound, you're adding some built-in motivation and accountability.

Figure Out What's Holding You Back

Before you can implement steps to reach your goal, it's important to determine what's been holding you back so far. Are you struggling to feel motivated? Is working out hard because you don't have a babysitter? You can't justify the cost of a gym membership or personal trainer? Whatever is holding you back, it's important to acknowledge it so you can get past it.

Break the Plan Into Smaller Pieces

Rome wasn't built in a day and your goals won't be accomplished in one fell swoop either. Take the big goal and break it into smaller pieces. Set a smaller goal to start and celebrate when you accomplish it. You'll feel great about hitting a goal, which will make you more likely to continue.

Do What Can When You Can

Get extra movement during everyday tasks. Although it may not seem like much, every little bit of extra activity goes a long way when you're trying to be more active. Park in the farthest spot and walk a bit more when you go to the grocery store. Go for a walk on your lunch hour. Get up and walk around during television commercials.

Find Your Way

Working out for a specific event or goal can be great for motivation. To maintain motivation long term, it's important to find your "why". This is the real reason behind working out. When you know your "why" and are reminded of it every day, it's a whole lot easier to get up before sunrise for a run.
